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
MESSAGE FROM FOUNDER/CHAIRWOMAN

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month, celebrated every February, honors the contributions of Black Americans throughout history and promotes a greater understanding and appreciation of our rich cultural heritage and resilience. President Gerald R. Ford officially declared it a national observance in 1976 through a proclamation. However, the origins of Black History Month go back to the 1920s, when historian Carter G. Woodson established Black History Week.

Each day of Black History Month, WOLCF spotlighted Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Throughout the 28 days of February, one of these distinguished institutions showcased was Tennessee State University, the alma mater of William O. Lockridge (continues on page 4).

DID YOU KNOW?


The U.S. Department of Education was established in 1979, making it one of the youngest federal agencies. Before that, education was managed by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, which was discontinued in that same year.




I hope you enjoy this newsletter and see WOLCF's work firsthand. I am genuinely thankful, and none of this would be possible without you.



There are currently 101 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). In the 1930s, 121 HBCUs existed, representing three percent of the nation's public and private colleges. Today, 7 offer doctoral programs, 52 offer master's programs, 83 offer bachelor's degree programs, and 38 offer associate degrees.

During Black History Month, the William O. Lockridge Community Foundation highlighted 28 HBCUs

U.S. FOREIGN SERVICE Initiative

The six sessions of the U.S. Foreign Service Initiative (USFSI) concluded on March 22nd with an awards ceremony, the presentation of completion certificates, and the announcement of the 2025 class of WOLCF International Ambassadors, who are set to travel to Luanda, Angola, this summer.

For three years, the USFSI has offered career opportunities in international affairs to high school students in Wards 7 and 8, showcasing options in both the public and private sectors. Over six two-hour Saturday sessions, participants engaged with various topics, including International Trade, African Tourism, Environment and Agriculture, African Art and Culture, Domestic and International Media, and International Diplomacy.

Speakers for the final session on International Diplomacy speakers were Priscilla De Lemos Coelho (First Secretary, Embassy of the Republic of Angola); Dana Banks (Senior Advisor, Africa Business Center, U.S. Chamber of Commerce); and Ryan M. Macauley (Investment Associate, U.S. International Development Finance Corporation).

Field trips were taken to The Washington Informer, Anacostia Community Museum, and Anacostia Art Gallery & Boutique.

Taylor Muie (10th grade, McKinley Technology High School), Maegan Godoy (12th grade, Friendship Technology Preparatory Academy), Cire Wilson (12th grade, Duke Ellington School of the Arts), and Carlone Leach (10th grade, McKinley Technology High School) were selected for the 2025 Class of WOLCF International Student Ambassadors.

Ambassadors Muie, Godoy, Wilson, and Leach will depart from Washington for Angola on July 18 and return on July 28.

LOGAN ARTHUR


